

## INCOME TAX SEASON: Choose your Tax Return Preparer Wisely

## THE IRS WARNS TAXPAYERS SHOULD BEWARE OF GHOST TAX PREPARERS

## **Ghost Preparers...**

- May require payment in cash only and may not provide a receipt or even Form 1040
- Invent income to qualify their clients for tax credits
- Claim fake deductions to boost the size of the refund
- ★ Direct refunds into unknown accounts (not the taxpayer's account)
- Charge fees based on the size of a refund

- By law, anyone who is paid to prepare or assists in preparing federal tax returns must have a valid **Preparer Tax Identification Number** (PTIN).
- The IRS Directory of Federal Tax Return Preparers with Credentials and Select Qualifications (<a href="https://irs.treasury.gov/rpo/rpo.jsf">https://irs.treasury.gov/rpo/rpo.jsf</a>) can help identify many preparers by type of credential or qualification.
- No matter who prepares their return, taxpayers should review it carefully and ask questions about anything that's not clear before signing. They should verify their routing and bank account number on the completed tax return for any direct deposit refund (<a href="https://www.irs.gov/refunds/get-your-refund-faster-tell-irs-to-direct-deposit-your-refund-to-one-two-or-three-accounts">https://www.irs.gov/refunds/get-your-refund-faster-tell-irs-to-direct-deposit-your-refund-to-one-two-or-three-accounts</a>) refund. Taxpayers should watch out for ghost preparers putting their bank account information on the returns.
- If you have been GHOSTED, report preparer misconduct using IRS Form 14157, Return Preparer Complaint (https://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/f14157.pdf).
- If a taxpayer suspects a preparer filed or changed their tax return without their consent, they should file Form 14157-A (<a href="https://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/">https://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/</a> f14157a.pdf), Tax Return Preparer Fraud or Misconduct Affidavit.
